

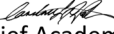




A survey of major works of art in all media from Prehistory through the end of the 14th Century. Artistic styles will be discussed in relation to contemporary history, society, and culture. Individual works of art will be explored as well as the role of art and architecture in a cultural context.

Course will:

1. Identify and evaluate representative works of art from Prehistory through the 14th Century
2. Analyze works of art on a visual basis
3. Analyze works of art in their historical and cultural context
4. Evaluate works of art using appropriate vocabulary and methods of inquiry
5. Investigate the use of techniques and processes of art
6. Investigate the formal properties as a means to interpret content
